Winter weekends found families sledding down the steep hill in front of the Mary Fletcher Hospital (now Fletcher Allen) and coming to a screeching halt just before flying over the snow bank into traffic on Colchester Avenue. The Flynn Theater was a movie theater along with the Strong and the State theaters, before they burned down; and Memorial Auditorium handled everything the Sheraton Conference and Miller Expo Centre's handle today. Church Street department stores like Magrams, Abernathy's, Woolworth, and JC Penney were the downtown anchors. While you could count the number of fine dining restaurants on a couple of fingers, there was never a lack of bars to hang out in or listen to music; and the waterfront was pretty much a ferry dock surrounded by rail lines and oil tanks.

So what makes Burlington such a wicked good place? For me, two things nature and people. First, being sandwiched between the shoreline of Lake Champlain and the Green Mountains, Mother Nature has dealt us a strong hand. All year round, locals and visitors enjoy our mountains and our lake.

Our culture of community, fun, creativity, giving, passion, and pride fuels all that goes into making Burlington a wicked good place to be.
